It is recommended that students take advantage of on-campus housing as they provide an easy and affordable alternative to apartment hunting. It is critical that all students apply as soon as they have been admitted to be first on the waitlist. Placement is based on the date put for available move-in date; as such it is to your advantage to indicate the absolute soonest you can be in San Diego.

If your preference lies with off-campus housing it is recommended to work together within your cohort to find an apartment together as to save time and energy.

I.A. On-Campus

The Department of Housing and Dining Services operates several housing complexes in an effort to provide the greatest degree of flexibility for students selecting their residence. Housing is limited. The housing communities you may choose from are One Miramar Street, Single Graduate Apartments, Mesa Residential Apartments or Coast Apartments. Descriptions of each community are available by visiting the housing home page:hds.ucsd.edu/arch/gradhousing.html.

Eligibility

To be eligible for a housing agreement, you must be regularly enrolled in a University-recognized degree granting program and carry at least twelve (12) units per quarter. Please refer to specific eligibility statements for each community. Additionally, you must have a zero balance due in your University account.

Application Process:

Applications will only be accepted online and from students who have been formally admitted to UCSD. To apply online for on-campus housing:<u>https://hds.ucsd.edu/ARCH_WaitList/ARCHMainMenu.aspx</u>. When you apply for housing you must submit proof of acceptance for admission (or a copy of your current I.D. card). If claiming couple with children status, copies of certified birth certificates and/or applicable custody documents of any children are required at move in.

I.B.ii. San Diego Neighborhoods

Balboa Park

Located just east of downtown, and about twenty minutes south of UCSD, Balboa Park is home to the world famous San Diego Zoo, and to many museums, including the Museum of Man, Centro Cultural de la Raza, the San Diego Museum of Art, Museum of Photographic Arts, Reuben H. Fleet Science Center, and the San Diego Aerospace Museum. For additional information, visit their website: <u>www.balboapark.org</u>.

Barrio Logan

San Diego's Barrio Logan is one of the oldest neighborhoods in San Diego, and home of historical sites such as Chicano Park that is visited every year by thousands of tourists. Three of the most popular Mexican restaurants in San Diego are located in Barrio Logan Chuey's, Porkyland, and Las Cuatro Milpas. Merely 18 minutes form UCSD.

City Heights

One of the most diverse communities in San Diego with more than 30 dialects spoken here, City Heights continues to be one of the city's true redevelopment success stories. This neighborhood is approximately 20 minutes from UCSD. Many small businesses still thrive here, offering products and merchandise of the varied cultures which are present here that are hard to find in most shopping centers and supermarkets. The recently completed Urban Retail Village and soon to be opened Trans West housing and business center have helped continue the revitalization of this fascinating neighborhood.

Clairemont

Clairemont is located about 10 minutes southeast of campus, and six miles from the beach. This community provides all the amenities for affordable student living. Clairemont is accessible to campus by three major highways, Interstate 5, highway 52, and Interstate 805. Clairemont rents generally are reasonable, and the area offers shopping centers, restaurants, and banks. Clairemont is located within the free UCSD/SDT bus zone

Del Mar/Solana Beach

Del Mar and Solana Beach are upscale coastal communities with small shops and restaurants located approximately five miles north of UCSD. Del Mar is home to the Del Mar Race Track, Del Mar Fairgrounds, and one of the many farmer's markets in the county. Solana Beach is "home" to . They are both accessible by bus or car.

Downtown San Diego

Located about 20 minutes from UCSD campus, downtown is the urban center of San Diego. Overlooking the San Diego Harbor, downtown offers a wide variety of galleries, restaurants, theaters, shopping, and nightlife. The historic Gaslamp Quarter is located in the heart of downtown San Diego. Little Italy and a growing art district create a cultural environment on the outskirts of downtown.

Golden Triangle/University City

The community surrounding UCSD is a short bus or car ride from campus. The Golden Triangle is comprised of several communities of apartments, condos, and houses, as well as three major shopping areas. La Jolla Village Square is located less than a mile South of campus. Costa Verde Center is centrally located in the Golden Triangle. Just east is the University Towne Center (UTC), the largest of the three shopping centers. Students who live

in graduate student housing or around the Golden Triangle find it convenient and accessible. University City is five minutes southeast of campus and can be accessed from Genessee Avenue and Highway 52.

Hillcrest

About 15 minutes south of Campus, Hillcrest is where the UCSD Medical Center is located. The Medical Center is accessible by the UCSD Campus Shuttle. The Hillcrest community has a neighborhood feel to it and is home to some of the best and most inexpensive restaurants in town. Hillcrest offers unique shops, coffee and movie houses, and is also home to a large LGBT community.

La Jolla

UCSD is located in La Jolla, on a bluff overlooking the coastline. La Jolla is also home to Scripps Institution of Oceanography, the La Jolla Museum of Contemporary Art, and a picturesque downtown. Although living off campus in La Jolla is costly, the climate and beach provide the perfect setting for recreational activities such as surfing, bike riding and sunbathing. Downtown La Jolla is lined with restaurants, coffee shops, and boutiques.

Mission Bay

Mission Bay is home to SeaWorld and offers great areas for picnicking, barbequing, and recreational water activities. It is the perfect setting for running, sailing, or kayaking. Mission Bay is also the location of the Mission Bay Aquatic Center. There you can find a number of recreational activities and classes to participate in as a UCSD student (visit their website: <u>www.missionbayaquaticcenter.com/</u>).

Mission Beach

Mission Beach is home to Belmont Park and its famous roller coaster. The Mission Beach boardwalk is a prime location for fun and recreation under the San Diego sun; you can rent bicycles or rollerblade.

Mission Valley

Located about 20 minutes southeast of UCSD, Mission Valley is a shopper's paradise and includes two large retail centers: Mission Valley Center and Fashion Valley. Mission Valley also boasts several hotels, a golf course, and Qualcomm Stadium, home to the San Diego Chargers football team.

North Torrey Pines

Immediately north of UCSD is a scenic drive through Torrey Pines state beach. This state park includes 14 miles of trails for hiking, hidden caves, and a beautiful beach. North Torrey Pines is also home to a growing biomedical and technological industry and the Torrey Pines Golf Course.

Old Town

San Diego's historic Old Town has a unique flavor within a colonial Spanish setting. The state park consists of restaurants and shops with early San Diego architecture. Old Town can be reached by the San Diego Trolley, a system that connects downtown San Diego, the San Ysidro border area, and the east county. A major transit depot, Old Town connects with San Diego Transit buses, and the Coaster commuter trains.

Pacific Beach

Pacific Beach is located a few miles south of UCSD, and is called "PB" by the locals. The community is lined with restaurants, bars, and nightclubs. The beaches provide some of the best surf in the county. The boardwalk stretches from the Pier to Mission Beach's Pirate's Cove. This beach community is home for many college students and young professionals.

II. Transportation

Driving

If you have your own car, you may wish to purchase a graduate student parking permit. There are various types' permits available for purchase to fit your needs: Annual, Limited, Occasional Use, or Alternative Schedule. Biking

III. Out of State Students

Out of state students are urged to begin establishing residency in California once they move to San Diego so that they will not be required to pay Supplemental Tuition during their second year.

III.A. Establishing Residency

Students seeking classification as a resident for tuition purposes must have established residence in California for more than one year immediately preceding the residence determination date for the term during which s/he proposes to attend the University. The student must have relinquished any previous residence. The residency deputy is the only person authorized to advise on residency matters. Inquiries should be directed to the Residence Deputy at the Office of the Registrarresidencedeputy@ucsd.edu, (858) 534-4586.

Indications of your intent to make California your permanent residence can include the following: registering to vote and voting in California elections; designating California as your permanent address on all school and employment records, including military records if you are in the military; obtaining a California driver's license or, if you do not drive, a California Identification Card; obtaining California vehicle registration; paying California income taxes as a resident, including taxes on income earned outside California from the date you establish residence; establishing a California residence in which you keep your personal belongings; and licensing for professional practice in California. Your intent will be questioned if you return to your former state of residence when the University is not in session. Documentary evidence is required and all relevant indications will be considered in determining your classification.

III.A.i Automobile Registration

If you are considering becoming a California resident, you must register your vehicle. If the car is registered in your name and you are a resident of the state in which you purchased it, license plates will generally continue to be valid until the expiration date, but for no longer than one year from the date first used in California. This is true even

though the license plate may be valid for more than one year in your home state. For further information on vehicle registration contact the Department of Motor Vehicles at (800) 777-0133 or visit their web site at www.dmv.ca.gov.

III.A.ii Driver's License

If you drive a vehicle and plan to establish residency in California, you must obtain a California driver's license within ten days after your arrival in San Diego. Proof of Auto Insurance is also required in San Diego. For Department of Motor Vehicle locations and information call the DMV of San Diego County at (800) 777-0133 or visit their website at www.dmv.ca.gov.

III.A.iii Voting

To register, U.S. citizens must be at least eighteen years of age and a resident of San Diego County for one day or more with a permanent address. For further information on voting contact the Registrar of Voters at (858) 565-5800 or visit their web site at www.sdvote.com. Students who plan to establish California residency should first consult with the residency deputy in the UCSD Office of the Registrar prior to making arrangements to vote by absentee ballot in their home state. Students are strongly encouraged to actively participate in the community; voting is one way to do so.

IV. **International Students**

IV.A. Supplemental Tuition

Unfortunately, International Students cannot establish residency in California and as such will be charged Supplemental Tuition by the University.

IV.B International Center

If you are neither a U.S. citizen nor a Permanent Resident of the United States, please pay an early visit to the UCSD International Center located between Mandeville Lane and Library Walk. The International Center is open Monday through Friday from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm.

As soon as they arrive, all international students, professors, and researchers are required to do two things:

- 1. Check In Bring your passport, I-94 card, I-20 or DS-2019, and any other related document(s) so that you can complete check in. (F-1 and J-1 students must check in before SEVIS registration can be completed.)
- 2. Attend Orientation All new international graduate students are required to attend a mandatory orientation session. To register for orientation, please visit http://isso.ucsd.edu/students/admitted.html. (Weekly orientation sessions are also held for international professors and researchers.)

New international graduate students, particularly those coming from other U.S. institutions, need to check in or complete the necessary transfer process at the International Center before they can receive funds from UCSD. IV.C. Banking

A number of established financial institutions are located nearby in La Jolla Village Square Center on Nobel Drive and Villa La Jolla Drive. There are also several other ATM machines in the vicinity, located on the UCSD campus in the Price Center and the Student Center, in the Costa Verde Shopping Center, University Towne Center, and throughout the city of San Diego.

Located in the Price Center East is a branch office for Chase (http://chase.com). UCSD is also home to a branch office of USE (University and State Employees) Credit Union, a full-service financial institution that provides services to all faculty, staff, and students at UCSD. Tuition and Fees are broken down in the following ways:

Nonresident Supplemental Tuition- Only charged to Non-Residents and International Students. US Citizen Non-Resident students should apply for California Residency at the end of their first year to avoid this charge their second year. Student Services Fee Tuition University Center Fee

Recreational Activities Fee Graduate Student Associate Fee Health Insurance

Please note that none use of services will not except you from being charged (i.e. you are still charged a Recreational Activities Fee even if you never step foot in one of the gyms on campus).

VI.A. Tuition Fee Remission

Students who are employed at least 25% in an academic position will qualify students for a Tuition and Fee Remission. The eligible academic positions are:

Teaching Assistant- A teaching assistant (TA) assists in the instruction of an upper or lower division course at the University under the supervision of a faculty member. The TA primarily assists the faculty member in charge of the course by conducting discussion or laboratory sections that supplement faculty lectures and by grading assignments and examinations. A TA may also assist with the development of assignments or exams, hold office hours and proctor examinations. In the case of basic language, reading and composition, some other skills-building courses, and a few other courses, a teaching assistant may lead the class meetings, but as with all other TAs, the general instructional content of the course, as well as the official assignment of student

grades and decisions on grade appeals, are the responsibility of the faculty member in charge of the course. In no instance shall a teaching assistant be assigned responsibility for the entire instruction of a course. **Reader**- A reader assists a course instructor by grading homework, papers, or exams and may also hold office hours to answer students' questions about such assignments.

Graduate Student Researcher (GSR)- A GSR performs research related to the student's degree program in an academic department or research unit under the direction of a faculty member or authorized Principal Investigator.

Under the Tuition and Fee Remission Program, the university will adjust student payment to exclude Student Services Fee, Tuition, and Health Insurance. Only GSRs will be eligible to also receive an adjustment to exclude Non-Resident Supplemental Tuition. Find out more information here.

VII. Health Insurance

VII.A. Graduate Student Health Insurance Plan (GSHIP)

The Graduate Student Health Insurance Plan (GSHIP) is a comprehensive group health plan and is mandatory for all graduate and professional students. Primary care is provided at UCSD Student Health Services (SHS). When you are within a 150-mile radius of SHS, you must start your health care at Student Health Services in the absence of a medical emergency. SHIP provides annual coverage including summer and holiday periods. To be covered under SHIP over summer, a student must be enrolled in the plan for the preceding Spring quarter. The SHIP plan includes dental benefits and vision discounts at the SHS Optometry Department. Information on separate health insurance for dependents of graduate and professional students is available at the Insurance Office located in the Student Health Center.

Students already covered by health insurance that was in effect prior to acceptance as a graduate student at UCSD may qualify for a waiver of the mandatory SHIP if benefits are equal to or better than SHIP benefits. Waiver application forms must be submitted with specific documentation prior to registration and waiver deadlines. The waiver application, which lists the required documentation, is available at the Student Insurance Office or at their website.

Brochures describing SHIP benefits, SHS referral requirements, policy limitations and exclusions are available at Student Health Services, the Student Insurance Office, and the Office of Graduate Studies. Additionally, the brochure may be viewed and downloaded via their website. Insurance information and consultations are available on a walk-in basis at the Student Insurance Office or by phone or email.

For first-year students arriving on campus prior to the start of the academic calendar year, it is highly recommended that you review your current insurance status and purchase short-term coverage if necessary. Unless your department has arranged an alternate start date, SHIP will begin on the first day of the Fall quarter. Early SHIP coverage for students is available when their graduate department begins their orientation prior to the first day of Fall Quarter and must be arranged by the department graduate coordinator.
